6a. Module Description

In this module you'll learn the tools of effective short fiction writing, beginning with the literary short story and moving on to explore short fiction for younger readers and some areas of genre fiction. You will understand the scope and the conventions of short fiction in English through analysis of a diverse range of classic and contemporary examples. You'll look at the creative process from the collection of ideas at the notebook stage to the production and editing of a finished narrative, and you will engage in this process by maintaining a reading journal and writer's notebook where responses to literature that is read, and created, are recorded.

6b. Outline Content

- the history of the literary short story
- analysis of classic works of short fiction
- forms and outlets for contemporary short fiction
- the opportunities, techniques and limitations of short fiction as opposed to other forms of imaginative writing
- effective techniques for opening, developing and concluding short stories
- use of observation and creation of convincing settings, action, characters and dialogue
- the creative and practical processes of effective fiction writing
- reading as a writer
- giving and receiving constructive criticism
- techniques for engaging readers of short fiction
- the special techniques of writing and researching short fiction for younger readers
- opportunities within genre fiction
