LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

6a. Module Description

In this module you will gain an in-depth exploration of the sociology of race, racism and ethnicity. We will consider three related themes: the social origins and significance of racial and ethnic divisions; the (varied) causes, contexts, and consequences of racism and antiracism; and the cultural dynamics of migration and globalisation. To do this, you will keep returning to three key concepts: racialisation (the social and political construction of racial difference), racism (the ways in which race structures social relationships), and identity (people's understanding of similarity, difference and belonging).

Each theme will be developed using a combination of theory and research-based case study material. You will apply these to consideration of examples and evidence drawn from contemporary society, politics, and policymaking. Although the primary substantive focus of the module will be on contemporary Britain, insights will be drawn from historical and international comparisons.
