6a. Module Description

This module aims to facilitate the development of each individual student's knowledge and approach to management and to lay the foundations for the development of their approach to management. Management is a personal undertaking and every manager will manage differently based upon their knowledge, understanding, beliefs and experiences. The aim of this Module is to encourage each student to develop their own approach to management by establishing a solid foundation of management knowledge and practice; integrating these with their own values, experiences and goals, that will provide a basis for the life-long development of their management skills. The module focuses on developing the ability to apply theory to practice and to enable students to develop practical approaches to managing in a built environment. The module uses case studies to demonstrate the application of concepts and principles. The module is based on a sound understanding of the theories and practice of management, reinforced by examples of best practice drawn from a wide range of organisations and industries, together with an appreciation of the context and constraints that influence organisations and management. The module will consider the main activities of management from an integrating perspective, together with identifying and developing the qualities required to be a successful manager, including leadership. The module adopts a „middle of the road“ approach to management, establishing a central point of reference that will allow students to critically evaluate alternative perspectives and theories in relation to each topic. Employability skills Students will acquire management skills and knowledge that will provide an essential element in their employability and career development. It will improve their analytical, problem-solving and communication skills, as well as developing their professional awareness and understanding of organisations.
