6a. Module Description

Drawing on research from social psychology, health psychology, as well as examples from sociology and media studies, this module explores key elements of what it means to be gendered and sexual beings.

You will explore traditional and social constructionist theories of sex, sexuality and gender, what society considers 'normal' (hetero) sexual practices and relationship behaviours, how the mass media constructs idealised forms of sex, issues regarding sexual health and education.

If you are considering a career as a psychologist, counsellor, social worker, primary or secondary school teacher or any profession that requires interaction with people of different sexual orientations or gender identities, this modules will give you a greater understanding of what it means to be a sexual being and the nuances within this.
