LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

6a. Module Description

Building on your knowledge from “Self and Society”, in this course you will cover the main British Psychological Society taught content in terms of social psychology, developmental psychology, and individual differences. The module takes a lifespan developmental approach that considers brain, cognitive and social development from infancy through to old age, as well as theories of human psychological development, normative changes, atypical development, sources of individual differences, and influences of different social contexts. You will have the opportunity to apply academic knowledge to real world issues and develop transferrable skills through group work and problem-based learning in the practical classes.

6b. Outline Content

This module will cover fundamental topics in social psychology (attitudes and stereotypes, group processes, social influence, and intergroup relations), developmental psychology (typical and atypical development in social and cognitive domains, theories of human development) and individual differences (personality, cognitive style, emotion and mood), with an emphasis on applied issues (e.g., childhood behaviour problems, adolescent peer pressure, romantic attraction and relationships, prejudice, adjustment to ageing). Practical sessions will build on the lecture material and use a problem-based learning approach designed to improve your employability-relevant skills.
