<p>This module looks at the technologies and business practices required for live event management.</p> <p>The module explores the working practices in the roles involved. You will look at promoting events, booking artists and venues, and financial considerations. Practical aspects such as live sound engineering, stage management, lighting and visuals are covered in detail. Online promotion is also reviewed.</p> <p>You will look at these areas in the context of a wide variety of events, including theatre, conferences, festivals and artist tours.</p> <p>You will then organise, promote and run one or more live events. There will be opportunities to work in groups, to collaborate with other students in Cambridge School of Creative Industries, and to work on events both on-campus and off-campus.</p>
