<p>Understanding how to make positive changes within a community begins by collecting information about the community's needs and challenges, and the factors that affect the people in that community.</p> <p>A needs assessment can help to identify the most important issues to the community, such as preventing childhood obesity or keeping young people in education.</p> <p>Learn how to undertake community profiling and needs analyses and how to use these to propose possible solutions to the issues you have identified.</p> <p>Initially, you'll undertake critical review of case studies of community profiles and needs analyses, focusing on the issues and provision within the community, through the lens of social justice.</p> <p>After this you'll use your experience of being part of a community (whether this is a geographic community such as a workplace or a identity-based community such as being part of the LGBTQ+ community or being from a specific ethnic group) to learn how to develop a community profile and needs assessment of that community and how to develop a possible provision to respond to the identified needs.</p> <p>You'll develop both knowledge and skills that are relevant to a wide range of interprofessional careers.</p>
