### 6a. Module Description

This module explores significant moments of difference between cultures and subcultures around the world. You will draw from your own cultural experiences as well as learning from others and lecturer-lead case studies, you will gain the skills required to explore and articulate similarities and differences between different cultural practices, institutions and beliefs.

This module will provide you with a platform for to explore intercultural issues in contemporary global society, describing the key concepts and components of culture. You will compare and contrast different cultures' analytical frameworks. This module will introduce you to key concepts and explores various perspectives in intercultural studies, covering different expressions globally and historically of power. It aims to make you aware of and develop empathetic understanding toward other cultures and value systems. The inter-disciplinary nature and critical thinking approach of the program will empower you for a meaningful encounter and cooperative action with other cultures and systems.

### 6b. Outline Content

Define the intercultural characteristics of different periods of time (Marxism, Napoleon, Darwin)

Explore the tools and skills that human beings have developed to problem solve

Demonstrate understanding of cultural differences and develop awareness of people from other cultures, the study of signs and symbols (semiotics)

Apply ideas and methodologies to our contemporary world situation (gender, social justice, anarchy, Brexit)

Analyse and debate crucial ideas and problems of humanity and culture (global trade, education, modern technology)

Develop critical thinking, free discussion, and awareness of oneself and one's environment

Explore broad vision, civic consciousness, and ethics

Overview basic elements of major formal theories (Identity, self-expression, expansion, post colonialism) and/or models relevant to Intercultural Studies.

Identify different areas of debate within Intercultural Studies.
