You'll develop a thorough understanding of the major areas of the law of tort, including key concepts and principles with particular emphasis on their application and evaluation as the law operates in society. You'll gain a sound knowledge of the principles of tort, enabling you to suggest solutions to factual problems and analysis of contemporary issues. You'll also develop an appreciation of those within the sector such as courts, insurers, employers and the Health and Safety Executive.

As this module fulfils part of the seven Foundations of Legal Knowledge, in alignment with the Bar Standards Board's requirement compensation is not permitted for this module.

6b. Outline Content

General principles applicable to the law of tort:

- Parties; joint, several and vicarious liability; and
- General defences; contributory negligence, volenti non fit injuria; and
- The major torts (such as Negligence, Occupiers' liability, Product liability, Nuisance and the rule in Rylands v Fletcher, Trespass to Land, Breach of Statutory Duty) and their constituent elements; and
- Remedies; the role of damages. Injunctions; and
- Legal research; and
- Writing skills.
