## LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

### 6a. Module Description

This module critically introduces you to the nature and scope of EU law with reference to its key institutions and formation. In particular, this includes the way in which EU law is enforceable through national domestic courts and the European Court of Justice (ECJ). It then examines essential topics of EU substantive law with reference to EU legislation and case law. These topics include: the free movement of goods and persons within the EU, the creation of European citizenship, the free movement and rights of workers within the EU and the legal reasoning and judicial remedies used by the European Court of Justice to resolve conflicts between EU and national law.

Given the event of Brexit meaning that the UK has ceased to be a member of the EU and that IP (Implementation) Completion Day has passed, the module will pay particular attention to the European Union (Withdrawal Agreement) Act 2020 (which amended the 2018 version). UK courts are no longer bound by any principles laid down, or decisions made, by the EU although a UK court may have regard to decisions and principles from European Court of Justice – as well as anything done by the EU or any of its entities – after IP completion day if it considers it appropriate to do so. This legal uncertainty will enable you to engage in interesting and creative discussions about how UK national law will develop post-Brexit.

As this module fulfils part of the seven Foundations of Legal Knowledge, in alignment with the Bar Standards Board's requirement compensation is not permitted for this module.

- The nature and scope of EU law with reference to its key institutions and formation
- The role of the European Court of Justice and its relationship to national courts
- The principles of direct effect, indirect effect and state liability
- The single market and the free movement of goods and persons within the EU
- The creation of European citizenship
- The free movement and rights of workers within the EU
- The legal reasoning and judicial remedies used by the European Court of Justice to resolve conflicts between EU and national law
- The causes of Brexit with reference to nationalism and European identity
- The implications of the European Union (Withdrawal Agreement) Act 2020 in guiding UK national laws after Brexit
