LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

6a. Module Description

Sustainable development depends on people worldwide working together towards a common goal, of ensuring the survival of the planet for future generations. However, there are hugely competing needs at all levels. It is essential to understand what these forces are, and how governments and businesses around the world compete for diminishing resources, based on the needs of their populations, infrastructure, politics and economics. Governments are funded by the taxes they raise from businesses and the individuals that work for them and so there is both a link and a conflict between the resource needs of businesses and the needs of the population and the environment they live in. The United Nations has coalesced its ideas into the 17 Sustainable Development Goals – we shall discuss whether these are attainable, and what the conflicting demands are for meeting these goals.

It is hugely important for scientists in the field of sustainability to understand how to communicate science to different audiences, to negotiate amid these conflicting forces, and to arrive at solutions which can be agreed by everyone. In this module, we shall discuss aspects of the public understanding of science and the importance of evidence-based communication; develop an awareness of environmental economics, such as the uses of ecosystems services, and aspects such as carbon offsetting; be aware of aspects of environmental ethics, regulations and law; develop an understanding of environmental psychology and effective communication; and enhance your understanding of politics, globalisation, and international development and how these affect the drive to a sustainable future. We shall also review the use of the sustainable development (SD) tools, which allow us to assess the impact of interventions, and apply these to case studies.
