## LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

### 6a. Module Description

The way we communicate may depend on a wide variety of factors including the place we grew up in, our age, our gender, and so on and so forth. At the same time, the way others communicate with us may depend on their perception and understanding of who we are. This module introduces you to the field of sociolinguistics. We will explore the intersection between language choices in actual communication and the various factors that could influence them. The module is particularly focused on the social side of communication. In doing so, we will look at different forms of communication including written (e.g. letters), spoken (interviews) and visual communication (e.g. linguistic landscape) in today's contemporary societies.

Key employability skills developed on this module include (i) improving knowledge of how acts of communication unfold, (ii) enhancing communication skills, and (iii) the application of basic IT Skills.
