LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

6a. Module Description

This module provides an overview of the psychological representation of language, touching upon the nature of language and languages; animal communication; child language acquisition; the relationship between language, thought and meaning; and language disorders. You will first learn about the way first languages are acquired and how this process and end-product differ from animal communication systems. You will then move on to consider the connection between language and thought and how words and sentences come to be meaningful. Finally, you will learn about language disorders, both in terms of how and why language can become impaired and in terms of what this means for our understanding of language more widely. During the module you will be introduced to many of the core questions about language and you will encounter some of the main theories and ideas of the discipline. The overall focus will be on the development of transferable intellectual skills, including the recognition of what constitutes evidence, the analysis of data to provide it, the critical evaluation of arguments, and the identification of underlying assumptions.

The module contributes to the development of your employability skills including self-management, teamwork, oral communication, and IT skills.
