6a. Module Description

In this module you will discover the strategies of adaptation and the afterlives of a range of nineteenth-century literary texts. We will look at sequels and prequels to nineteenth-century novels and will also analyse the move from page to screen, web series, and other forms. We will explore the afterlives and adaptations of the work of Jane Austen, the Brontës, and Charles Dickens. You will develop a comprehensive knowledge of the texts studied in relation to their historical and cultural context and an understanding of adaptation theory. You will also develop your research and communication skills which are key employability skills.

This module has productive cross-overs with the module Nineteenth Century Literature and Environment.

- Neo-Victorianism
- Literary afterlives in sequels and prequels
- Analysis and discussion of adaptation through different art forms and mediums
- Application of adaptation theory
