6a. Module Description

On this module you will study an exciting period of literary history, the Renaissance, from the different perspectives of cross-cultural encounters and their impact on English imaginative writing of the period. This research-based module gives you the opportunity to explore, in-depth, the early modern literary fascination with travel and other cultures, debates around colonialism, terrestrial and extra-terrestrial 'other worlds', theories of creation and knowledge of nature, and relations between humans and animals. You will explore these issues in weekly seminars, investigating the relationship between the set texts and their literary, cultural and historical contexts, including politics, race, religion, scientific knowledge, gender and the environment. Upon successful completion of the module, you will have a greater understanding of poetic, prose and dramatic texts from the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, as well the cultural, historical and literary contexts in which they were written and performed.

6b. Outline Content

Topics for study will include:

- utopian literature
- · early science fiction and writings about outer space
- · different cultures and geographies on the early modern stage
- · travel writing
- · creation narratives
- · literary responses to the natural world.
