## LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

### 6a. Module Description

This module introduces you to what is known as 'forensic linguistics', i.e. the application of language skills and relevant methods to forensic contexts. The module seeks to enable you to explore the intersection between 'language' and topics/issues such as law, crime and trial processes. The module also sheds light on the role of language in such emerging phenomena as cybercrime. The focus of the module is on all forms of language use including spoken, written and computer-mediated communication.

The module, consists of lectures and seminars in which you will work in small groups, provide feedback to your peers and reflect on your own performance with a view to sharpening your forensic analytical abilities. The topic of the week is introduced in the lecture and explored in seminar discussions.

The key employability skill developed on this module is forensic data analysis opportunities, especially the ways language analysis skills could be used in resolving real-life forensic scenarios.

### 6b. Outline Content

The module explores a wide range of topic which may include:

- Language of the law
- Language and the criminal justice system
- Authorship analysis
- The role of language in cybercrime
- Language and the court
- Police interviews
- Crime narratives
- Vulnerable witnesses
