LEARNING, TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

6a. Module Description

You will be introduced to the concept of property and proprietary rights, as they are recognised and protected in equity, and explore the nature of the trust. You will study an historical account of the development of and distinction between law and equity before examining the nature of equitable rights and remedies. Over the module you will gain a sound knowledge and understanding of equity and trusts law, developing your critical analysis to suggest reasoned solutions to factual problems. Trusts are used in a wide array of circumstances therefore this module considers the importance of equity and trusts in a legal practice, possibly as a commercial or family practitioner, of property, conveyancing, or in relation to wills and the administration of estates. You will also consider fiduciary relationships, charitable status and trustee duties.

In addition to studying equity and the law of trusts as an academic component of legal studies, this module is designed to reflect some elements required by the Bar Standards Board (BSB) and Solicitors Regulation Authority (SRA).

6b. Outline Content

In addition to a rigorous exploration of equity and trusts as an academic component of legal studies, this module is designed to reflect necessary elements required by the Bar Standards Board (BSB) and Solicitors Regulation Authority (SRA). Professional Conduct is pervasive across this module.

Indicative content aligns with requirements of the BSB and SRA, taking into consideration developments by, and requirements of, these professional bodies insofar as possible. Content will therefore include, as a minimum:

- Core principles of trust law
- Creation and requirements of express trusts
- Beneficial entitlement
- The distinction between charitable trusts and non-charitable purpose trusts
- Resulting trusts
- Trusts of the family home
- Liability of strangers to the trust
- The fiduciary relationship and its obligations
- Trustees (for example: appointment, removal, powers and duties)
- Trustees' liability
- The nature of equitable remedies and the availability of tracing in equity

Opinion writing and legal research skills are key to your success in this module. You will also apply relevant core legal principles and rules appropriately and effectively to realistic client-based and ethical problems and situations. You will be supported to:

- Accurately identify issues
- Use appropriate methods and resources, and ensures that sources are up to date
- Cite accurately and appropriately
- Present the research trail clearly
